Call for Entries: 6th Annual Banned Books Week Trading Cards

Chapel Hill Public Library is seeking small (5 x 7") original works on paper, inspired by books or authors that have been challenged, censored, or banned.

Seven of these works will be selected by a jury to become trading cards. All entries are displayed in an exhibit at the Library during Banned Books Week and beyond. Trading cards are distributed for free during Banned Books Week and beyond.

Banned Books Week (BBW) is an annual national event celebrating the freedom to read and the importance of intellectual freedom. Held from September 23 to 29, 2018, BBW highlights the benefits of free and open access to information while drawing attention to the dangers of censorship by spotlighting actual and attempted banning of books. Chapel Hill Public Library coordinates this project to bring these important issues into the community's conversation in a fun, interesting, and unique way.

Renew Residential Parking Permits

Residential parking permits expire July 31. If you live in a residential parking district, you can renew your permit now. The Residential Parking Permit Program helps manage parking in residential areas where nonresident parking impacts the ability of residents to park.

Residents may obtain permits for \$25 per year if they live on a street where parking is prohibited and there is no practical way of parking off the street. Fees will be waived for those age 65 or older. Visitor and Guest permits are also available.

It's hot! Here's how to stay cool this summer.

The Town of Chapel Hill offers indoor and outdoor pools so you can stay cool in the summer heat.

The Town manages three aquatics facilities, including the A.D. Clark Outdoor Pool at Hargraves Center, 216 N. Roberson St.; two indoor pools at the Homestead Aquatic Center, 300 Aquatic Drive—a warm water pool and a lap pool; and an indoor pool at the Chapel Hill Community Center. All facilities have locker rooms, showers and family changing rooms.

Swim during open swim times or sign up for a program. Programs offered include swimming lessons for all ages and water fitness. Learn more at chapelhillparks.org.

New Parking Options— and New Meters!

The Chapel Hill Police Department is now managing the CVS Parking Deck, which has been renamed the Rosemary Parking Deck, at 125 E. Rosemary St. and the Mallette Street parking lot, behind the Franklin Hotel, .311 W. Franklin St.

New Parkeon meters have been installed to make parking downtown even easier. Parkeon pay stations have been installed in the Rosemary/Columbia parking lot and the Wallace Parking Deck. Search for parking spaces on parkonthehill.com and pay from your phone with the Parkmobile app. Pay for the Mallette Street parking lot using the Parkmobile app only.
