Chapel Hill 2020 Public Information Session

A public information meeting to discuss the Chapel Hill 2020 Draft Comprehensive Plan will be held at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 19, in the Council Chamber of Town Hall, 405 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. The purpose of the public information session is to share information about how the draft plan is being revised to reflect community comment and the Planning Board's recommended revisions.

The visioning plan will be considered for possible adoption by the Town Council on June 25. For those unable to attend Tuesday's meeting, it will be aired on Chapel Hill TV-18 and provided later on streaming video at www.townofchapelhill.org/councilvideo.

The 2020 plan will be an overall policy document, balancing the many voices and ideas about our community's future. This document, the vision and framework for the Town's future, will be followed by implementation – making the vision into reality.

Notice of Lease of Property

The Town of Chapel Hill, in accordance with N.C.G.S. Secs. 160A-267, 160A-279 and 160A-272, provides this notice of the adoption by the Chapel Hill Town Council, on June 11, 2012, of a resolution approving a sub-lease of a parcel of land of 1.66 acres, more or less, located at 2700 Homestead Road, for \$1.00 per year to the Inter-Faith Council for Social Service, Inc. (IFC).

The sub-lease will allow the IFC to construct and operate a facility known as the Community House Men's Transitional Housing Facility in accordance with the terms of a Council-approved special use permit and Good Neighbor Plan. The term of the lease is 50 years, with the possibility of a 10 year extension. The property is being leased to the Town by the State of North Carolina.

Community Meetings with Police Department

Residential parking permit renewal begins July 1

If you live in a Town of Chapel Hill residential parking district, your parking permit is scheduled to expire on June 30. Applications for the July 2012–June 2013 year will be accepted starting July 1.

Residents may apply if they live on a street where parking is prohibited and there is no practical way of parking off the street. The fee for a residential parking permit is \$25 per year. A fee will not be charged for those age 65 or older (proof of age must be provided).

Also new to the Residential Parking Permit program—3 day and 14-day Temporary Parking Permits. These temporary visitor passes will now be available to anyone living in residential areas. Up to 10 three-day permits may be purchased in a year for \$2 each. Up to five 14-day permits may be purchased each year for \$10 each. Guest permits are available for short-term parking of 24 hours or less within residential parking zones.

The Residential Parking Permit Program was created in 1978 and has since grown to include more than 15 neighborhoods. The program helps to manage parking in residential areas where nonresident parking is impacting the ability of residents to park. The goal is to protect and improve the quality of life and character in the neighborhood by reducing the amount of overflow parking, discouraging cut-through traffic and ensuring adequate parking spaces for the residents.
