Library Hours Increase in August

In late August, the Chapel Hill Public Library will restore six hours of operation on Saturdays and Sundays. The schedule will be 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Wednesday; 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Thursday through Saturday; and noon to 6 p.m. Sunday.

Responding to community concerns about reduced hours in the newly expanded facility, the Town Council adopted its budget for 2013-14, which includes funds to begin restoring library hours of operation. A library survey asked respondents to rank what hours were most important to them, and survey responses overwhelmingly showed that weekend hours were most important.

Residential Parking Permit Renewal

Residential parking permits expire on July 31. Applications for the 2013-2014 year are now being accepted. Residents may apply if they live on a street where parking is prohibited and there is no practical way of parking off the street. The fee for a residential parking permit is \$25 per year. Fees will be waived for those age 65 or older.

Also available are 3-day and 14-day Temporary Residential Visitor Parking Permits. Guest permits are available for short-term parking of 24 hours or less within residential parking zones.

The Residential Parking Permit Program helps to manage parking in residential areas where nonresident parking impacts the ability of residents to park.
