

Thursday, March 22: 7-9 pm FROGS & TOADS

Jeff Hall, Partners in Amphibian & Reptile Conservation Biologist
NC Wildlife Resources Commission

Come and learn all about frogs, including their vocalizations. This workshop will consist of an indoor session that will cover frog and toad calls, identification and ecology, all focused on the Piedmont area. In addition, participants will receive a brief overview of the citizen science frog call monitoring program, the North Carolina Calling Amphibian Survey Program. If time and weather permit, we will step outside and listen for calls of nearby species.



Hired in 2007 by the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, Jeff Hall is the Partners in Amphibian and Reptile Conservation (PARC) Biologist. He has been active in many conservation groups and societies, but especially the North Carolina Herpetological Society, where he has served in many capacities. As PARC Biologist, Jeff works with landowners to promote habitat management activities that benefit reptiles and amphibians as well as other wildlife species. He coordinates the North Carolina chapter of PARC helping to bring public and private partners together to further conservation efforts for reptiles and amphibians. Jeff also participates in field work on a variety of projects including rare amphibian monitoring and habitat restoration, upland snake conservation, and Project Bog Turtle. In addition, Hall manages the Calling Amphibian Survey Program (CASP) which is designed to monitor long-term trends of frog and toad populations across the state. Jeff, his wife Shannon, and two boys live in Greenville, NC.
