## Charting Our Future

What's in the future for Chapel Hill? On May 10, the Town held the first of a series of events to Chart the Future of Chapel Hill. The Franklin Hotel hosted this Kickoff & Idea Exchange to solicit input and to answer questions such as, "Today, this area of Town is..." and "In the future, this area of the Town should be..." The next event will be Show and Tell Sessions at University Place (201 S. Estes Drive), across from Alfredo's Pizza Villa. Please join us from 3 to 6 p.m. Sunday, June 10 and from noon to 1:30 p.m. and 5:30 to 7 p.m. Monday, June 11. These sessions will include intensive workshops in which planning and design ideas are generated, filtered, and discussed by participants as we work to knit together past planning efforts; provide cohesion between existing areas of development along major corridors; and look more closely at some of our gateways into Town.

Charting Our Future is a unique Town project to hone the Future Land Use Map in the Town's Comprehensive Plan, Chapel Hill 2020, and to rewrite the Town's Land Use Management Ordinance (LUMO). We hope to complete this refinement effort by the end of the year, when the Town Council adopts a new Future Land Use Map as an amendment to Chapel Hill 2020.

There will be more opportunities for community input, both on-line and in person, through the end of the year.
