

Sorry, No Renting Parking Spaces!

We don't want to fine you! So you need to know. Renting, leasing or lending of parking spaces in residential neighborhoods, for someone other than a homeowner/tenant or visitor, is a violation of the Code of Ordinances. Violators, including the property owner, tenants and owner of the vehicle, are subject to a penalty of \$100. Repeated violations are subject to increased penalties of \$250 and \$500.

Presentation on Photographer Bayard Wootten

Bayard Wootten, perhaps North Carolina's best-known photographer in the first half of the twentieth century, is the subject of a presentation on September 16, by Jerry Cotten, author of *Light and Air: The Photography of Bayard Wootten*. The event, which is free and open to the public, will be held from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 16, in Meeting Room B at Chapel Hill Public Library, 100 Library Drive.

Wootten, who embraced an artistic style of photography known as Pictorialism, operated studios in several North Carolina towns, including Chapel Hill, between 1928 and 1954). Her landscape images and insightful portraits of Southerners, both black and white, resulted in numerous exhibitions, lectures, and books illustrated with her photographs. Wootten was known for her independence and determination as a woman and as a photographer.
