The RedBall Project Is Coming to Chapel Hill

The Ackland Art Museum is bringing the RedBall Project, a traveling public art work by Asheville-based artist Kurt Perschke, to Chapel Hill starting Thursday, Sept. 20. The piece features a 250-pound, 15-foot-diameter inflatable red ball that is installed in both unlikely and familiar sites within a city.

For seven days, the giant ball will move through Chapel Hill, changing its location daily and playfully inviting people to reconsider their everyday surroundings with a fresh perspective.
