Open House for NC 54 Users

Residents, commuters and other users of the NC 54 corridor between Old Fayetteville Road in Carrboro and Manning Drive in Chapel Hill are encouraged to attend a community open house from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 29, in Century Hall at the Carrboro Century Center, 100 N. Greensboro St., Carrboro. The community open house is a drop-in format where attendees can review preliminary findings, ask questions and offer valuable first-hand perspectives for improving safety and mobility along the 4.5 mile-long corridor.

The NC 54 Bicycle and Pedestrian Corridor Safety Study is a twelve month-long study that is projected for completion in fall 2019. Agencies involved in the project's Study Team include the Towns of Carrboro and Chapel Hill, Chapel Hill Transit, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NCDOT Traffic Safety Unit, NCDOT Division 7, NCDOT Division of Public Transportation, and the NCDOT Division of Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation.

Neighborhood Meeting: Greene Tract and Rogers Road

Discuss future land uses for the Greene Tract and the proposed zoning ordinance for the Rogers Road neighborhood at a neighborhood input meeting from 3 to 5 p.m. Sunday, April 28.

The 104 acre Greene Tract is jointly owned by Chapel Hill, Carrboro and Orange County. A resolution has been adopted by Carrboro and Orange County and is being considered by Chapel Hill to designate about 21 acres as open space, 11 acres as a school site, and the remaining 72 acres as possible mixed income housing.
