No, We Don't Solicit Donations

Scammers are always coming up with new tricks to steal your hard-earned money. The Chapel Hill Police and Fire departments do not call residents asking for donations. Don't be afraid to ask for identifying information (a name, position in the organization, call-back number, etc.).

The police department has received information in the past on scammers cloning numbers to look like they're calling from the police department. If you experience such a situation, you can ask to call that person right back, even if your caller ID is already showing the number you intend to call.

When Town officials contact individuals, we do not ask for money, gift cards, or personal information.

If you receive a questionable call, take note of identifying details such as accent, what agency they claim to be calling from, and the type of information or payment they're attempting to get from you, and report that information to the Police Department at 919-968-2760.
