The Chapel Hill Town Council will meet at 7 p.m. Monday, Nov. 15, in the Council Chamber of Town Hall, 405 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., to consider an agenda that includes the following:

University Square, Mixed Use Development File No. 9788-26-8572

The Town has received a request for review of a Concept Plan submittal proposing redevelopment of University Square including demolition of the existing retail and office space and construction of a mix of office, retail and 150 dwelling units for 560,000 square feet. Parking for 510 vehicles and cultural space is also proposed. Granville Towers dormitory is proposed to remain unchanged. The site is located on the south side of W. Franklin Street at 123 W. Franklin Street, adjacent to Panera Bread on the west and the University Baptist Church on the east. Vehicular access to the site is proposed from the existing two entrances on W. Franklin Street. The 6.2-acre site is located in the Town Center-2 (TC-2) and Office Institutional-1 (OI-1) zoning districts, part of the Downtown Master Plan, and identified as Orange County Parcel Identifier Number 9788-26-8572.

The Cottages of Chapel Hill, Multi-Family Development

The Town has received a request for review of a Revised Concept Plan submittal proposing a multi-family development at 2109, 2209, and 2217 Homestead Road. The site is located on the south side of Homestead Road between the Norfolk and Southern Railroad and Southern Orange Human Services Center and across from the Homestead/Weaver Dairy Road Extension intersection. The application proposes 191 dwelling units in 107, two-story buildings, and 1,090 parking spaces. Access is proposed from Homestead Road. The 33-acre site is located in the Residential-2 zoning district and the Resource Conservation District. The site is identified as Orange County Parcel Identifier Numbers 9870-90-0457, 9870-90-4109, and 9870-90-7548.

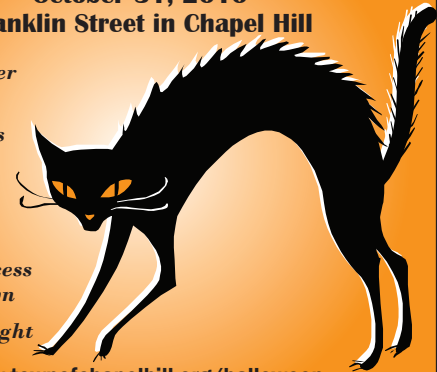

Homegrown Halloween Returns to Franklin Street

Homegrown Halloween will return to Chapel Hill on Sunday, Oct. 31, 2010. The shared effort among the Town, University and Downtown businesses aims to return Halloween on Franklin Street to its roots as a small town community gathering and to reduce crowd sizes.

In the past, the event has attracted an enormous crowd (upwards of 80,000 in 2007). Confined in the downtown area, this large gathering presents many public safety concerns related to personal and property crime, crowd panic and large scale civil disorders. Additional concerns focus on alcohol poisoning and gang-related violence. All of which spills over onto the University campus and adjacent neighborhoods.

Traffic access to downtown Chapel Hill will be restricted starting at 7 p.m. There will be no bus shuttles although Safe Ride buses will operate for UNC-Chapel Hill students. Alcohol checkpoints will be in place, and DWI enforcement will take place with cooperation from the NC Highway Patrol. The Town will work with downtown bar and restaurant owners to restrict alcohol sales after 1 a.m. Franklin Street will reopen to traffic at midnight.
